

CAISO's Hard Head Award supports individuals working towards equity and justice for all, whose work connects political advocacy, creativity, and coalition-building.

Last year's call attracted 14 nominations across a broad range of human rights and social justice work, that included Comedy for Social Causes, Deaf Community Support, HIV/AIDS Advocacy, Mental Health Support, LGBTQ+ Rights, Rainforest Habitat Protection and Protest Mas.

lan Dhanoolal, represents not just the deaf community, but his presence gives voice to the work of most marginalised groups.

Deaf leader, activist, researcher, interpreter & storyteller, lan Dhanoolal, was adjudged winner of the 4th Annual Colin Robinson Hard Head Award, at a ceremony last evening at ThinkArtWork Studio, Port of Spain. Dhanoolal, 49, is the founder of Trinidad and Tobago's first Deaf-led advocacy organisation, the Deaf Empowerment and Advancement Foundation (DEAF).

Awarding Dhanoolal the Hard Head Award opens the much-needed conversation about disabilities and places focus on the urgent need to put in place, the physical and imaginative infrastructure that shifts the term disability into an ability that is different but no less.

Our annual end of the year event recognised five other finalists: Khaleem Ali (human rights and youth activist); Gillian Goddard (systems thinker, community organiser, chocolate maker); Conrad Mitchell (activist and human rights educator); Amílcar Sanatan (artist, academic, and activist); and Cyrus Sylvester (activist and community organiser). Sanatan and Sylvester were singled out for special mention by the Judges. Inspired by the fearless ways in which Colin Robinson – late co-founder of CAISO: Sex and Gender Justice - used creative imagination to speak out against injustice.

Lock in with CAISO and stay tuned for our next progressive, inclusive, and elevating LGBTQI+ event.




EDUCATE TO EMPOWER: Resource Guides



"You've got to tell the world how to treat you. If the world tells you how you are going to be treated, you are in trouble."



CAISO stood in solidarity with women worldwide and gathered for the International Women's Day Rally and March in Woodford Square, POS.








TRANS DAY OF VISIBILITY

COMMUNITY CHALLENGES WITH PUBLIC MENTAL HEALTH

Because wholeness and iustice remain at the heart of what we do, CAISO held a meaningful Share Space in March on the unique challenges faced by LGBTQI+ individuals when seeking mental health care services within Trinidad and Tobago's public health sector and the way forward.

We explored the exciting possibilities for transforming mental health care access for LGBTQI+ folks in T&T, while also troubleshooting innovative solutions and actionable steps to create a more inclusive and supportive environment for everyone.





QUEERING THE PRACTICE

Facilitated by CAISO's dedicated Community Therapist, Akilah Riley Richardson and Case Worker, Rae Alibey; this Wholeness & Justice Clinical Webinar held in March proved to be an insightful exploration of the challenges faced by LGBTQI+ individuals within the public mental healthcare system in TT and how these gaps affect mental health treatment adherence.

Participants had a great opportunity to deepen their understanding of the unique challenges faced by LGBTQI+ community and to explore practical strategies for fostering a more inclusive and supportive mental healthcare environment in TT.

what art + imagination reveal & restore

Mas Healing is space to engage creative energy and healing for ourselves and community through a series of creative healing workshops and artistic mas-making practices. The workshops facilitate healing practices through mas-making and skill-sharing around selfcare and community care. Mas Healing is a co-created space developed and facilitated by CAISO team members Angelique Nixon and Shaden Alexander (who are both artists and healing justice practicioners).

The main goal of Mas Healing is to encourage self-advocacy and empowerment for LGBTQI+ community members. Participants use their own creativity as a tool for self-expression, processing emotions, grounding and balance, and recharging the spirit. Jouvay is our inspiration, our catalyst, our guide for the mas we create individually and together. In our first year of Mas Healing 2023, we made Jouvay Mas and took our mas on de road.

In our second year of Mas Healing, we held our workshops in April after Carnival but still used Jouvay as our inspiration. We focused on on nature and climate justice as it intersects with gender and sexual justice. Our experiences of marginalisation and oppression reflect the ways the environment and nature have been exploited and abused. Our liberation is connected to all struggles for gender, sexual, racial, economic, and ecological justice.

We created masks and messages around healing for ourselves and the earth – using the elements of nature to activate and share what we want to represent through Jouvay (as a space of freedom, power, and creative self-expression).
