

Share Space & Capacity Building Work


We heard first-hand recollections and reflections by Ozzy Warwick, Merle Hodge, Khafra Kambon, Amilcar Sanatan, Richard Young and others. Closing with a re-reading of Beverly's eulogy by Jacquie Burgess, co-convener and representative of Women Working for Social Progress.

"Beverly Jones was a revolutionary! she was a young woman. She was a Trinbagonian. She was a patriot. Beverly Jones and the others believed that another world was possible." - Ozzy Warwick, Chief Education and Research Officer, OWTU

"The presence of guns, pointing at our people, will not solve the problem. Poor people all over the world are clamouring for a change. This event was hosted by CAISO, in collaboration with WOMANTRA, Oilfields Workers' Trade Union, and Women Working for Social Progress.






Building from our 2022 campaign on Anti-Police Violence, CAISO's 2023 campaign continues to explore Mapping (In)Justice through looking at restorative justice and discussing alternatives to policing and the prison system in Trinidad and Tobago. Its purpose is to shed light on the flaws in the current criminal justice system and advocate for a more just and effective approach to addressing crime and its consequences.

The campaign is important because it addresses critical human rights issues, including police violence and the inefficiencies of the prison system. It aims to highlight the need for reform and change in the criminal justice system, focusing on racial profiling, police brutality, overcriminalization, mass imprisonment, and recidivism as systemic flaws that must be addressed.

Mapping (In)Justice is an anti-police violence social media campaign for better policing. The 2022 campaign employed a "know your rights" methodology to create awareness and mobilise key stakeholders.

CAISO celebrated Deaf Awareness Month with the **Sign Together Graduation and Closing Ceremony** on September 28, 2023, at the British High Commissioner's Residence. Six students successfully completed the five-level Trinidad and Tobago Sign Language (TTSL) program introduced by CAISO in 2021. The program had 17 hearing participants from the LGBTQI+ community, civil society, and private sector organizations in its first phase, with 33 initial enrollees, and they achieved Level 3 certification in TTSL.

In the second phase, conducted in partnership with the Deaf Empowerment and Advancement Foundation (DEAF), nine students enrolled, and six of them completed Level 5 in August. Sign Together is the only free TTSL program offering tuition up to Levels 4 and 5. As a result of the program, over 20 LGBTQI+ individuals and service providers now have various levels of TTSL proficiency.



Congratulations to the six Level 5 Graduates for their achievement and best wishes for their continued journey toward cultural integration and providing more inclusive services to Deaf LGBTQI+ individuals.







Inspired by CAISO's founding director, Colin Robinson, the Hard Head Award (HHA) recognises and honours exceptional leadership in transforming how others see and imagine the world, particularly in the spheres of Transformational Activism, Artistic Boldness and Meaningful Solidarity.


